Directions

HORIBA is located in a quiet, almost residential section of North Edison, a town located in central New Jersey.

HORIBA is convenient to highways Routes #1, 9, 22, 27, 287/440, New Jersey Turnpike (Rt #95), and the Garden State Parkway. HORIBA Jobin Yvon Inc. is 15 minutes driving time north of New Brunswick, 40 minutes South of Newark Liberty Airport, 60 minutes south of New York City, 90 minutes north of Philadelphia (PA), and +2 hours southwest of John F. Kennedy (NY) Airport.

From the NJ Turnpike (North or South)

1. Take the New Jersey Turnpike to Exit 11 - Garden State Parkway.
2. Take the Garden State Parkway North to Exit 131. Do not take the Exit marked A or B.
3. As you come around the exit ramp stay to the right; this will put you onto Route 27 South.
4. At the 2nd traffic light, turn Right (Wood Ave).
5. Go to the first traffic light, turn left (Oak Tree Rd).
6. Go to the sixth traffic light, turn Left (Park Ave).
7. Go about 1 mile, HORIBA Jobin Yvon is on the right.

From Route 1 (North or South)

1. Take Metuchen Exit off Route 1 (Main St./Route 531).
2. Take Main St./Route 531 for about 2 miles to Plainfield Ave.
3. Turn left onto Plainfield Ave.
4. At next traffic light, turn right. Plainfield Ave. changes into Plainfield Rd.
5. At the next traffic light, turn left (Park Avenue).
6. At the next traffic light, turn right (you are still on Park Ave).
7. Go 3 tenths of a mile, HORIBA is on the left.

From Route 287 North

1. Take Route 287 North to Metuchen Route 27 North.
2. At the first traffic light, turn left (Bridge St).
3. Make a sharp right immediately after crossing the railroad bridge.
4. At the next light turn left, (Central Ave).
5. At the third light, turn left, (Park Ave).
6. At the the next traffic light, turn right, (you are still on Park Ave).
7. Go 3 tenths of a mile, HORIBA is on the left.

Return trip (287 Southbound):

1. Exit the building and turn right onto Park Ave.
2. Go right at the first light onto Talmage Ave.
3. Go 1.9 miles to the light at New Durham Ave and make a left.
4. Go to the second light and make a right onto Bridge St.
5. Go to the next light and make a right onto Route 27.
6. Entrance to 287 South will be just ahead on your right.

From Route 287 South

1. Take Route 287 South to Metuchen Exit (Exit 3) (New Durham Rd/County Road 501).
2. Turn right onto New Durham Road.
3. At next light, turn right.
4. At the second traffic light, (about 2 miles) turn left.
5. Go 3 tenths of mile, HORIBA Jobin Yvon is on the left.

Return trip (287 Northbound):

1. Exit the building and turn right onto Park Ave.
2. Go right at the first light onto Talmage Ave.
3. Go 1.9 miles to the light at New Durham Ave and make a left.
4. Cross over 287 and the entrance for 287N will be on your left.

From the Garden State Parkway (North)

1. Take Parkway north to Exit 131. Do not take the Exit marked A or B.
2. As you come around the exit, stay right, (Route 27 South).
3. At the 2nd traffic light turn right (Wood Ave).
4. At the next light, turn left (Oak Tree Road).
5. Go to sixth traffic light, turn left (Park Ave).
6. Go about 1 mile, HORIBA is on the right.

From the Garden State Parkway (South)

1. Take Parkway south to Exit 131.
2. As you come around the exit, stay right to Route 27 South.
3. At first traffic light, turn right (Wood Ave).
4. At the next traffic light, turn left (Oak Tree Road).
5. Go to sixth traffic light turn left (Park Ave).
6. Go about 1 mile, HORIBA is on the right.

From Newark Airport

1. Follow signs for airport exit.
2. Take the New Jersey Turnpike south to Exit 11 - Garden State Parkway.
3. Take the Garden State Parkway North to Exit 131. Do not take the Exits marked A or B.
4. As you come around the exit ramp stay to the right; this will put you on Route 27 South.
5. At the 2nd traffic light, turn right (Wood Ave).
6. Go to the first traffic light, turn left (Oak Tree Rd).
7. Go to the sixth traffic light, turn Left (Park Ave).
8. Go about 1 mile, HORIBA is on the right.

From LaGuardia Airport

1. Coming out of airport, take Grand Central Parkway West (toward Manhattan).
2. Go over the Triboro Bridge to Major Deegan Expressway.
3. Just after Yankee Stadium, take exit for George Washington Bridge.
4. Go over George Washington Bridge to New Jersey Turnpike South.
5. Take the New Jersey Turnpike South to Exit 11 - Garden State Parkway.
6. Take the Garden State Parkway North to Exit 131. Do not take the Exits marked A or B.
7. As you come around the exit ramp stay to the right; this will put you on Route 27 South.
8. At the 2nd traffic light, turn right (Wood Ave).
9. Go to the first traffic light, turn left (Oak Tree Rd).
10. Go to the sixth traffic light, turn left (Park Ave).
11. Go about 1 mile, HORIBA is on the right.

From JFK Airport

1. When leaving airport, take Belt Parkway West to Verrazano Bridge.
2. Cross bridge to Staten Island (I 278 N) and proceed to Goethels Bridge, which leads to the New Jersey Turnpike South.
3. Take the New Jersey Turnpike south to Exit 11 - Garden State Parkway.
4. Take the Garden State Parkway North to Exit 131. Do not take the Exits marked A or B.
5. As you come around the exit ramp stay to the right; this will put you on Route 27 South.
6. At the 2nd traffic light, turn right (Wood Ave).
7. Go to the first traffic light, turn left (Oak Tree Rd).
8. Go to the sixth traffic light, turn left (Park Ave).
9. Go about 1 mile, HORIBA is on the right.

Central Park

Central Park spans two and a half miles from 59th Street to 110th Street and half a mile from Fifth Avenue to Eighth Avenue and was the first urban landscaped park in the United States. Originally conceived in the salons of wealthy New Yorkers in the early 1850's, the park project spanned more than a decade and cost the city ten million dollars. Today, the park is home to numerous restaurants, playgrounds, the Metropolitan Museum, the Central Park Zoo, and Wollman Skating Rink.

Empire State Building

It's no longer the world's tallest skyscraper, but the classic Art Deco architecture and rich history make the 102-story Empire State Building a popular stop for visitors to the City. Built in 1931, the 1,454 foot tall building has an exterior observatory on the 86th floor from which visitors can see up to 80 miles away on a clear day. The observatory is open seven days a week, 9:30 am to midnight (last tickets sold at 11:15pm). Special holiday hours are observed. Security has been tightened recently so leave extra time and make sure to bring a picture ID. 350 Fifth Ave, at 34th Street. (212) 736-3100.

Ellis Island

Ellis Island is currently fully open. Liberty Island is also open, though access to the interior of the Statue of Liberty Monument is restricted as a security measure. For more information, call the Circle Line Ferry at 212-269-5755, or check their website, www.statueoflibertyferry.com.

Over 40% of the U.S. population descend from the 17 million immigrants that have passed through Ellis Island from 1892 to 1954. The three story Ellis Island Museum is housed in the same building that the immigrants came through in those 64 years. Ferry boats leave from Battery Park for the 27 acre island, including an option to visit the Statue of Liberty, located on an island nearby. Ferries operate 7 days a week, from approximately 9:30am to 5:00pm. For specific ferry schedules and information call, (212) 269-5755.

Rockefeller Center

Tour this famous mid-town complex by picking up the well written, easy-to-follow self guided tour map in the lobby of the GE building. It details Rockefeller Center's historical and cultural highlights, 24-acre underground shopping mall with over 300 shops, and the golden statue of Prometheus and the Channel Gardens. There are 35 restaurants in the complex, including the famous Rainbow Room. Located between 5th and 6th Avenues, and between 49th and 50th Streets. Take the B, D, F, and Q trains to Rockefeller Center.

Saint Patrick's Cathedral

Now dwarfed by surrounding mid-town buildings, the classic French Gothic style cathedral was considered "out of town" when it was constructed in 1879. It is currently the 11th largest church in the world. Fifth Avenue at 50th Street. Take the E or F train to 5th Avenue. Phone: (212) 753-2261

South Street Seaport

What used to be a bustling seaport in the 18th and 19th centuries, South Street Seaport now encompasses newly restored buildings which house a variety of restaurants, specialty food shops and boutiques. Also, nearby, the South Street Seaport Museum is located within the 12 square block Landmark Historic District that stretches from Fulton Street to the Brooklyn bridge. Take the 2, 3, 4, 5, J, or M train to Fulton Street, or the A or C train to Broadway-Nassau. Phone: (212) SEA-PORT.

The Statue of Liberty

Ellis Island is currently fully open. Liberty Island is also open, though access to the interior of the Statue of Liberty Monument is restricted as a security measure. For more information, call the Circle Line Ferry at 212-269-5755, or check their website, www.statueoflibertyferry.com.

Theater District

New York City's Theater District is contained within a thin strip of Manhattan, from 53rd to 42nd streets, between 6th and 8th Aves, called the Great White Way. There are approximately 36 theaters crammed into this small area of the city, most of which host world famous productions nightly.

Times Square

Known as the Crossroads of the World, Times Square is the heart of New York City, where commerce meets the performing arts, a magnet for both business and tourism. Located at 42nd Street where 7th Ave. and Broadway cross. Take the N, R, S, 1, 2, 3, 7, or 9 train to the Times Square station.

United Nations

Located on the banks of the scenic East River, this international zone is the only section of land in Manhattan that is not part of the United States. The 181 flags in front represent each of the member countries' commitment to working together for peaceful means of conflict resolution. Guided tours operate daily; English tours leave about every 15 minutes, from 9:15am to 4:45pm. Children under 5 years old are not permitted on tour. For tours in other languages, call (212) 963-7539 on the morning you want to visit to find out the schedule, or reserve a foreign language tour with a large group. Reservations are required for groups of 15 or more. First Ave at 46th Street. For information and reservations call: (212) 963-7113.

Museum Mile: The Museum Mile is a lovely stretch along 5th Avenue chock full of museums and other fine arts institutions. If you are in New York for a short stay and need to cram in lots of sightseeing, Museum Mile is a must.

Neighborhoods (New York)

The **Financial District** includes South Street Seaport, Wall Street, the New York Stock Exchange, and Battery Park City.

New York's **China Town** is the largest Chinatown in the United States and is adjacent to the Civic Center.

SoHo is famous for the galleries and shops lining its narrow streets and Little Italy is packed with NYC's best Italian restaurants and cafes.

The **Lower East Side** is a neighborhood built by immigrants throughout history.

Greenwich Village is home to Washington Square Park, NYU and NoHo.

The **East Village** is the place to go for any tattoos, piercings or crazy hair colors you've been wanting .

Tribeca is short for "triangle below Canal" and is home to many galleries and artists lofts.

Gramercy Park is a historic district from 18th to 21st Streets between Park Avenue South and Third Avenue.

Chelsea is an area in Lower Manhattan west of Park Avenue from about 30th Street to about 14th Street which includes the Flatiron District.

Central Park is the first urban landscaped park in the US. Today, the park is home to numerous restaurants, playgrounds, museums and zoos.

The **Upper West Side** is home to such venerable New York landmarks as Lincoln Center, Columbia University and St. John the Divine Cathedral.

The **Upper East Side** features Museum Mile, Gracie Mansion and six historic districts.

Harlem has a rich history in diversity; its neighborhoods include Hamilton Heights, Sugar Hill, and El Barrio (Spanish Harlem).

Midtown Manhattan offers hotels that are conveniently located near many of NYC's most popular sights.

Midtown West includes the Theater District, Times Square and the Garment District.

Miitown East features Carnegie Hall, Museum of Modern Art, Radio City Music Hall, St. Patrick's Cathedral, Rockefeller Center and skating rink and Grand Central Terminal.

Directions: Take NJ Turnpike use Exit #4 (Philadelphia/Camden) and exit onto Route 73 North. Follow to Route 38 West. Take 38 West across The Ben Franklin Bridge (toll) into Philadelphia. Follow Route 676-West (locally known as the "Vine Street Expressway") to the "Ben Franklin Parkway/Museum Area" exit. At the top of the ramp all traffic must turn right onto 22nd Street. Go to the first light and make a right onto the Ben Franklin Parkway. Stay in the far right hand lanes. One block later, turn right onto 21st Street. One block later, 21st Street intersects with Winter Street. Just past the intersection, the entrance to the parking garage is on your left hand side.

Directions: Take the New Jersey Turnpike to Exit 4 (Route 73). Go one mile on Route 73 North and take the exit for Route 38 West. Take 38 West toward Philadelphia to route 30 West (follow signs for the Benjamin Franklin Bridge). Go over the bridge and follow the signs for I-676 West. Take I-676 West to the Benjamin Franklin Parkway exit (22nd Street, Museum area), on the right side. At the end of the exit ramp, turn right onto 22nd Street and get into the far left lane. The Benjamin Franklin Parkway is a boulevard with two outside lanes and two inside lanes. Turn left onto the outside lanes of the parkway toward the Museum, which will be in front of you on the hill. Follow the sign for the Art Museum. After the sign, turn left at the first traffic light (Art Museum Drive). Follow the road up to the West Entrance of the Museum, where limited parking is available.

Independence National Historical Park (Liberty Bell and Independence Hall):

Take N.J. Turnpike to exit 4. Take Rt. 73 north to Rt. 38. Take Rt. 38 west to US 30. Take US 30 west over the Benjamin Franklin Bridge.

At the base of the bridge follow the signs for 6th Street. Take 6th Street south. there is an underground parking garage on the left between Arch and Market Streets.

Shopping (New York)

* **Antiquarian Books** - The area on and around W. 18th and W. 19th St. between 5th and 6th Ave. has become a Mecca for folks hunting for used and out of print books. While the Strand bookstore a little further south remains the grand father of all used bookstores, this neighborhood now boasts scores of small and not-so-small shops and stores where you can find just about any book imaginable. The Barnes & Noble Sales Annex, Academy Book Store, and the Metropolitan Book Auction are just a few places to look.

* **Antiques** - If you are looking for really elegant pieces and money is not a concern, try some of these galleries. Place des Antiquaries on 135 E. 57th St., between Park and Lexington Ave., and in the tri-level Manhattan Art & Antiques Center at 2nd Ave. and E. 50th St.. You will also find many varying shops on Broadway south of Union Square, in Greenwich Village, and throughout the Upper East side, and the South Bronx.

* **Diamonds** - This is the epitome of a New York shopping district and one of those places that you have to see to believe. Concentrated on W. 47th St. between 5th and 6th Ave., the diamond district glitters with great deals on diamonds and other jewelry. Fabric, Beads, and Trimming-This area is in the upper West 30's and lower West 40's, between 6th and 7th Ave. In addition to every imaginable kind of fabric, bead, and trimming, you'll find hats, feathers, buckles, and bangles here. You can also find a couple of good fabric stores in the Lower East Side and on Broadway between Leonard and Broome streets.

* **Fish** - The Fulton Fish Market continues to thrive as the city's source of fresh fish and seafood. 125 million pounds of seafood are sold here annually. The market operates between midnight and 8 a. m. in the South Street Seaport at the eastern end of Fulton St., just above the financial district.

* **Flowers**-The area between W. 26th and W.30th St. and 6th and 7th Ave. remains the place to get the best possible prices on flowers and plants. Planters, soil, and other supplies also are sold in this area.

* **Fur** - Go to the wholesale district between W. 27th and 30th streets on and around 7th Ave. if you want some great buys. As with diamonds and Oriental rugs, be careful. If there are any questions, you can call the American Fur Industry at (212)564-5133

* **Furniture** - There are warehouses and showrooms located on Lexington Ave. between E. 29th and E. 33rd St., but the public is not welcome at most of them. Another good spot is North Carolina Furniture Showroom, which is located at 5th Ave. and 21st St., the public is more than welcome here.

* **Handbags** - The area in the high 20's and 30's off 5th Ave. has a wide selection of good handbag stores. The Lower East Side also has a couple of stores with good discounts on fine leather and other handbags.

* **International Food** - If variety is what your looking for than 9th Ave. between the high 30' and the low 40's is the place! Whether your looking for fresh Italian bread, West African cassavas, or West Indian spices, this is a great place to look. The 9th Ave. International Food Festival is held here on the third weekend in May.

* **Kitchen Appliances, Lighting, and Restaurant Supplies** - "Restaurant Row" runs on and around Bowery Ave. from Chatham Square in Chinatown to Cooper Square at E. 7th St.. There are also stores around 1st and 2nd Ave. in the high E. 50's and low E. 60's. You can find virtually any thing you want.

* **Men's Discount Clothing** - For good deals look in the Flatiron district on and around 5th Ave. between 18th and 21st St.. There usually are people passing out flyers for them.

* **Perfumes and Cologne** - There are many stores around E. 17th St. between Broadway and 5th Ave. You will find many bargains around here, and be sure to try Jay's Perfume Bar.

* **Rugs** - If your not an expert, be careful. To be on the safe side, try the ABC Carpet outlet in the Bronx. Or try the the furnishing department of Bloomingdale's. If you think you know what your doing, look in the warehouse district at the west end of W. 12th St., and in the high E. 20's and low E. 30's between 5th and Park Ave. South.

* **Thrift Shops** - There are many offbeat thrift shops in the East Village. If your looking for something more upscale, try Madison Ave. in the E. 80's and the Yorkville Section of the Upper East Side.

* **Women's Discount Clothing** - Most of the nice discount women's clothing stores are on Orchard St. in the Lower East Side, from E. Houston south to Grand St.. Another spot is W. 8th St. between 5th and 6th Ave. for women's shoes.
